

Dear St. Peter's Family,



The spiritual posture for Advent is like the child standing on tiptoes in joyful expectation. We sing with expectant hearts: come thou long expected Jesus. We pray that when Christ shall come again in power and great triumph to judge the world, we may without shame or fear *rejoice* to behold his appearing (BCP 378). We can expect Christ to come again, and this is the good news of Advent.

The early church stood on her tiptoes. The earliest Christians expected Jesus to come again at any moment, and they waited with hope and joy for the second coming of Christ. St. Paul wrote to the early church in Philippi, "There's far more to life for us. We're citizens of heaven! We're waiting the arrival of the Savior, the Master, Jesus Christ, who will transform our earthly bodies into glorious bodies like his own. He'll make us beautiful and whole with the same powerful skill by which he is putting everything as it should be, under and around him" (Philippians 3:20-21, *The Message*). Yes, our God is a most generous God, and we can expect an even more wonderful life when Christ will come again.

I would encourage you to seize an opportunity to prepare yourself for the Advent of our Lord. Pray with your family around the Advent wreath. Stand on the tip of your toes when you sing an Advent hymn in church. Let yourself reclaim the joy of a child in this time of year. It is like the child waiting for the most special person in her life to walk through the door. Come, Lord Jesus, come. We will wait for you with joyful and expectant hearts.

November Vestry Highlights

The Vestry met on Monday, November 18, 2019 at 5:30pm. Fr. Bert opened the meeting with prayers, and then several members of the Vestry shared life and ministry moments. Several members shared how they were inspired by *Taking the Next Step* Sunday.

The Vestry approved the minutes from the regular October meeting.

The October financials had been emailed to the Vestry by the Controller, Kristie Keese. The financials had also been reviewed by the Finance Commission. The reports showed that our overall income is at 87% and expenses are at 89%. Kristie noted that while the giving was down for the month of October, the giving has increased for the beginning part of November. The financial report was approved by the Vestry.

On behalf of St. Peter's Episcopal School, Dee Elliott reported to the Vestry. Dee shared how the board is determining how to use the school endowment funds for special projects and events associated with the school. It was also reported that the school board members attended the most recent faculty meeting to express their appreciation and support of the faculty after the most recent NAEYC accreditation process.

Mickey Horany, Stewardship Commission Chair, reported to the Vestry. Mickey reported that members of the parish continue to turn in Estimate of Giving cards, and at this point, 73% of the cards returned are new or increased commitments. A letter and Estimate of Giving cards will be sent to those members of the parish who were not with us on *Taking the Next Step* Sunday. We look for more participation in our corporate effort to grow spiritually through the practice of generosity. The results of the campaign will be announced in early December. Mickey also thanked his fellow Vestry members for their help in serving the meal provided on *Taking the Next Step* Sunday.

David Martin, Chair of the Christian Formation Commission, reported to the Vestry. The Commission held its quarterly meeting on November 12. The Commission received updates on fellowship, education, and outreach. David also shared information on the upcoming events in Advent and Christmas.

Jim Hayes, member of the Endowment Board, reported to the Vestry. The Board continues to discuss a spending rate on endowment funds and will meet again in January. The Board also continues to focus on communications and sharing the purpose and gift of the endowment to the parish.

Lou Ann Maxwell, member of the Budgeting Committee, reported to the Vestry. The Committee has been meeting since October and will present a budget to the Vestry in January for a vote.

Lou Ann Maxwell, member of the Vestry and Delegates Nominating Committee, reported to the Vestry. The committee has several communicants in good standing on the slate, and nominations will close December 29.

Stephen Drane, Junior Warden, reported to the Vestry. Stephen is continuing to investigate options on relocating the green container on Jefferson or an alternative for a storage shed. He also reported that he is working on repairs to the bell tower.

Lou Ann Maxwell, Senior Warden, reported to the Vestry. Lou Ann reported on a couple of items of business related to payments from a bequest to the church and church-owned mineral rights. She also shared her ministry moment in writing. Lou Ann wrote:

Fr. Bert reported to the Vestry. Fr. Bert thanked the Vestry for their service on *Taking the Next Step* Sunday. He appreciated their part with serving at the brunch and their overall support and involvement in the campaign. Fr. Bert said he received significant positive feedback on the devotional used during the Taking the Next Step campaign. The devotional was written by Robert Schnase, and Fr. Bert plans to use more from Schnase on certain spiritual practices of fruitful congregations. Fr. Bert also reminded the Vestry about the Vestry and Staff Christmas Party cohosted by the Rector and Senior Warden at the Maxwell home.

Under New Business, David Martin and Lou Ann Maxwell reported on a list of capital repairs needed on campus. The list was presented with estimated costs for each project. The Vestry took action to proceed with certain projects giving the Finance Commission oversight and discretion in how each project can be funded from the appropriate sources.

The Vestry held an executive session. Following the executive session, the Vestry and Rector closed their meeting with the Lord's Prayer. The meeting was then adjourned.

The next regular meeting will be Monday, December 16, at 5:30pm in the Multipurpose Room of Tucker Hall. As always, anyone in the parish is welcome to attend. If you wish to be on the agenda and speak, however, please notify the Rector no later than the previous Tuesday, December 10, when he writes the agenda and then sends the agenda to the Vestry.

Let's Keep Our Eyes on the Rock of St. Peter's Endowment

As we approach the end of the year, the members of our parish's Endowment Commission are pleased to share with you the good progress the Rock of St. Peter's Endowment is enjoying. Please recall that during the past year we have made a concerted effort to bring to your attention the significant importance of our Endowment in providing financial security for our parish for years to come. As our endowment grows, our ability to increase our ministry grows, too.

In February of this year our Endowment Commission established a 10-year goal of \$8 Million for our endowed funds. At year end 2019, our endowed funds stand at approximately \$2,476,000. Aggregate growth for the past 36 months has been 25% when including contributions to the endowment and appreciation in the value of underlying assets. We were fortunate to have received parishioner contributions to the endowment of over \$100,000 during both this year and last. With generous contributions from parishioners and a reasonable rate of return on invested funds, we should be able to reach our 10-year goal of \$8 Million. If we reach that goal, our financial concerns are over. A 5% yield on funds of that amount will yield \$400,000 annually -- a sum clearly sufficient to accommodate any budgetary shortfalls. Our recent stewardship campaign, Taking the Next Step, focused entirely on our need to give, not on the St Peter's need to meet a budget. You should know that, in recent years we have not met our budget through our stewardship campaign and our endowment has covered the short fall. However, it has not been at a sustainable spend rate. If we meet our 10 year goal short falls will be a thing of the past, and we can increase our out-reach.

It is important that you know that the members of your Endowment Commission are consistently monitoring the manner in which your funds are being invested and insuring that the spend rate on those funds is consistent with prudent investment practices.

Thanks to all of those who have strengthened The Rock of St. Peter's Endowment—either with direct contributions or through estate provisions. Both are important. Both help us prepare for a future we cannot see. Should you wish to discuss the manner and means of giving to our Endowment, please contact one of the members of our Endowment Commission. Update on the Organ Rebuild - 11-19-19

An ad-hoc committee of Rebecca Williamson, David Martin, Stephen Drane, Rev. Bert Baetz, and myself, David Miron, has been meeting about design issues with the organ. We met Tuesday, November 19, to discuss the progress of the organ rebuild project, and want to share this information with the parish.

To date, this work has been completed:

Uninstalled, labeled, and packed all the components

Redesigned the layout and structure

Rebuilt the wind system

Built structures for main and single wind chests (where the pipes sit)

Installed about half of that structure

Built most of the other structural parts


Installed some; the structures are being installed from the back forward and floor up

In addition, we were given a 'free' organ from a church in San Antonio that was closing (which has a value of about \$30000). I spent about 6 weeks disassembling and packing this organ. I'm planning to incorporate most of the parts into our organ. This more than doubles the number of lower-pitched voices in the organ, allowing me to accompany hymns with more body and without as many of the higher-pitched stops that are difficult for people with hearing assistance devices.

The thing on most people's mind is: when will I be finished? My original estimate, with some changes approved by vestry, would have placed completion about November 21st. As in any rebuild (think an old house), I encountered unexpected things, and so most of the work has taken 30-40% more time than expected. Together with the time spent disassembling the free organ, and a slight amount of additional time to incorporate those parts into this rebuild, I anticipate parts of it will be playable before the end of this year and in time for Christmas Eve. Final completion with full operation is anticipated by March 15.

I understand, as music director, how much all of us want to have the organ back in worship. This rebuild will significantly enhance the worship life of the parish, and this work should not need to be repeated in our lifetimes. As an organ builder and organist, knowing how I am redesigning the instrument in this process, I know it will be worth waiting for!

The Magi in Scripture, Culture, and Art

We are excited to have Dr. Charlie McCormick, president of Schreiner University, lead us in a 3-week class exploring the history, legend, and representation of the wise men (or Magi). Though they only occupy a few passages of scripture, their cultural impact is vast. Marco Polo writes about his visit to their graves, the Medicis of Florence cast themselves in local performances as the Magi, and poets, artists, and musicians have made these three the centerpieces of their work.



During the Christmas season of 2005, a pastor at the church Dr. McCormick was attending exhorted the congregation to not simply go through the motions of that Christmas season. Instead, the pastor argued, make it an exceptional season through study and reflection. Dr. McCormick decided to take his pastor seriously, and for over a decade now, he has been studying the wise men or Magi.

For three weeks in December, we will explore the history, legend, and representation of these wise men in their many contexts. We are fortunate to have Dr. McCormick with us in Advent, and he hopes the class will help you see this Christmas season with brand new eyes.

Dr. McCormick has been the president of Schreiner University since the beginning of 2017. He came to Schreiner in 2009, has been in higher education since 1999. McCormick received his bachelor's degree in English from Abilene Christian University, his M.A. in anthropology from Texas A&M University and his Ph.D. in folklore and folk life from the University of Pennsylvania.

Charlie has been married to his wife Cayce for over 25 years, and they have two daughters.

Waiting in Anticipation for The King is Coming

Advent is a time of joyful, holy expectation. Of waiting. Of preparation for the King who is coming to reconcile a broken world. Wait. How does one wait? Who has time for waiting these days? There are feast to prepare. Lights to be hung. Presents to procure. There are things to be done, so let's get going. Go! Go! Go!

I am not going to fight what this season has become. For it is a season of preparation, joy and celebration. Rightfully so, but I propose that we all schedule in a little time to stop, wait and anticipate. For the King of all Kings is coming and that should command our attention.

"For to us a child is born, to us a son is given." (Isaiah 9:6)

Now that's a gift, y'all!

There are many methods and traditions on how to wait as a family during this advent season. One quick google search will supply endless pictures, crafts and ideas for your folly. Perhaps you have a family tradition that goes back generations? Awesome. If you're short on ideas or time that is ok, too. We created advent wreaths and passed out a brief 4 week plan for you to use with family or friends back in November. If you like it, use it!







Here is the tradition my father passed on to me. Feel free to elaborate on it. You may add songs, questions, discussion time or collects.

Step 1: GATHER

Grab your kids. No kids in the house? No problem! Grab your spouse, a friend or neighbor. I grew up a mile from my cousins, so we gathered at their coffee table each week for the four Sundays leading up to Christmas. Set aside a time. I personally like 7pm on Sunday evening.

Step 2: READ

If you have the booklet we handed out, use it! It will walk your though a brief liturgy as you light an additional candle each week. No booklet or wreath? No problem! Open up your Bible to Luke chapter 2 and read it aloud. If you have kids, let them read the story.

Step 3: PRAY

As we anticipate and celebrate the coming of Christ, keep your prayers focused on Him and His finished work on the Cross. We are forgiven, not because of what we have done or can do. We are forgiven because of Christ's finished work on the cross. There is rest and hope found in Him. Don't know what to pray for? No problem! Jesus laid it out for us in Scripture. Recite the Lord's Prayer together.

Step 4: REJOICE

God is good, so let's end in celebration! Don't have a guitar or piano in the home? No problem! A Capella is just fine when it comes to singing Christmas carols around candlelight. Joy to the World, O Come All ye Faithful, The First Noel, Away in A Manger. It's not complicated. Pull up the lyrics on your iPhone and sing.

Side note: the theology found in the lyrics of these classics are great teaching tools for children!

There you have it. A once a week gathering for 4 weeks. Throw in a 5th session on Christmas Day if you'd like. You can do this in as little as 5 minutes or draw it out to over half an hour. Your choice!

Let us be a church that rests. And waits. In anticipation, for the King is Coming.






Your remarkable life is happening right here, right now. You may not be able to see it – your life may seem predictable and your work insignificant until you look at your life as Frederick Buechner does.


