

December Vestry Highlights

The Vestry met on Monday, December 16, 2019 at 5:30pm. Fr. Bert opened the meeting with prayers, a reading from the Book of Amos, and a short Advent meditation written by Bishop David Reed. Then, several members of the Vestry shared life and ministry moments.

The Vestry approved the minutes from the regular November meeting.

The November financials had been emailed to the Vestry by the Controller, Kristie Keese. The financials had also been reviewed by the Finance Commission. The reports showed that our overall income is at 96% and expenses are at 97%. The financial report was approved by the Vestry.

On behalf of St. Peter's Episcopal School, Dee Elliott reported to the Vestry. Dee reported on the school events and activities leading up to the holidays. She also shared that the board and administration are investigating options on replacing the dated smart boards in the classrooms. Finally, Dee shared that the school received an anonymous donation in the amount of \$5,165 to cover the cost of the library system upgrade.

On behalf of the St. Peter's School Board, Amy Rector spoke to Vestry upon the invitation of the Rector. Amy serves on the School Board and reported to the Vestry that the School Director, Janet Boutin, has been in correspondence with city representatives about designating St. Peter's School as an official school zone. The School Board supports this action taken by the city, and the Vestry also expressed its support of this action, making St. Peter's an official school zone.

Mickey Horany, Stewardship Commission Chair, reported to the Vestry. Mickey reported that members of the parish continue to turn in Estimate of Giving cards, and we as a parish continue to see a very encouraging trend in the response. More cards are being turned into the office, and seventy-five percent of the cards returned are new or increased commitments. Fr. Bert and others from the leadership team will continue to encourage households to join the majority of the parish in taking the next step and offering an estimate of giving to our church. The leadership teams plans to share final results after the New Year.

Lou Ann Maxwell, member of the Vestry and Delegates Nominating Committee, reported to the Vestry. The committee has several communicants in good standing on the slate, and nominations will close December 29.

David Martin, reported on the plan for capital repairs and improvements. He will work on getting bids for certain repairs and work with the Finance Commission on the appropriate sources of funding, as the Vestry directed to do so in the November meeting. Fr. Bert also mentioned that he and David Martin have discussed the possibility of improving the lighting in the nave. Fr. Bert received a free estimate from a professional lighting company that could enhance the lighting in our nave. He will work with David and others on the feasibility of that particular project. The Rector and Vestry expressed their appreciation to David in seeing the overall plan move to a plan of action.

Stephen Drane, Junior Warden, reported to the Vestry. Stephen is continuing to investigate options on relocating the green container on Jefferson or an alternative for a storage shed. He is now speaking with Janet Boutin and representatives from St. Peter's school about a covered parking structure for the school bus. Stephen has overseen the change in the architecture for the church bell, making it easier for people to ring the bell. Also, during the Junior Warden's report, it was noted that the Tucker Hall kitchen stove hood was replaced and the Vestry moved to cover the cost from funds designated for Tucker Hall.

Lou Ann Maxwell, Senior Warden, reported to the Vestry. Lou Ann reported on a couple of items of business related to payments from a bequest to the church and church-owned mineral rights. Lou Ann also touched on a concern related to the rental of Tucker Hall. Lou Ann, Mickey Horany, and members of the church staff will form a task force to review our contracts and policies. The task force will report back to the Vestry with any proposed revisions or changes in policy.

Fr. Bert reported to the Vestry. Fr. Bert reported on the programs and activities that have taken place in Advent, and he hopes to continue with new offerings like the Advent Quiet Day in next year's planning. Fr. Bert

also handed out a list of organizations we as a church financially support through our operating budget. Our mission at St. Peter's is to give glory to God by knowing Christ and making him known to others. When we financially support other ministries and partner with them in their good work, it is part of meeting our mission at St. Peter's. Fr. Bert asked that the Vestry show its formal support of the following ministries for the purposes of our Outreach efforts at St. Peter's: Christian Assistance Ministry, Christian Men's Job Corp, Christian Women's Job Corp, Habitat for Humanity, Hill Country CARES, Hill Country Youth Ranch, K'Star Youth Shelter & Counseling, Raphael Community Clinic, Young Life, and Blessings in a Backpack at Starkey Elementary. The Vestry was unanimous in its support of these named ministries.

Under New Business, Mickey Horany spoke to work to be done with the task force to review our contracts and policies for the use of Tucker Hall. The Vestry offered some initial input, and the task force will report back to the Vestry in January. Also, under new business, the Vestry approved the St. Peter's School budget that had been reviewed and approved by the St. Peter's School Board.

The Vestry will review and approve the church budget at the January meeting. The Vestry held an executive session, and following the executive session, the Vestry and Rector closed their meeting with the Lord's Prayer. The meeting was then adjourned.

The next regular meeting will be Monday, January 13, at 5:30pm in the Multipurpose Room of Tucker Hall. As always, anyone in the parish is welcome to attend. If you wish to be on the agenda and speak, however, please notify the Rector no later than the previous Tuesday, January 7, when he writes the agenda and then sends the agenda to the Vestry.



Men - The Women Are Way Ahead It's Time to Catch Up!

When you take a look around at St. Peter's, it becomes readily apparent that the women of our parish are far more organized and active in parish ministries than are the men. Every woman in the church is a member of the ECW, a very active organization that meets routinely and sponsors numerous parish initiatives. There is the Cottage Shop, which is operated by our women and which generates significant income for various parish programs. Then there are the Daughters of the King, a vibrant and growing women's initiative within our parish committed to prayer, study and Christian action. We cannot leave out the Altar Guild, a group of very dedicated women who are instrumental in assisting the clergy and preparing the sanctuary for worship. So also we have the St. Jerome's Library Guild, another group that serves our parish in a very meaningful manner.

In comparison we men seem to come up somewhat short. We have our Tuesday lunch group that meets to discuss football and current events. And we have our Holy Smokers, who cook from time to time for parish events. But that is about it as far as organized men's programs are concerned. Don't get us wrong. This observation is not meant to demean or malign our men in any manner. Many of our men sing in the choir, help maintain our facilities, participate in our worship services and help usher. But the women do those things too. What we are talking about here is the dearth of organized men's programs in the parish. We could use them.

Understanding this, a number of our men recently commenced discussing the benefits that might redound to the parish were the men to become more proactive in their efforts to initiate and further new men's programs at St. Peters. Among other things, these discussions led to the formation of our new Brotherhood of St. Andrew Chapter. So far 15 of our men have joined this group, which meets twice monthly and which is committed to prayer, study and service to our church and community. This is a good start. These men have identified 2 initiatives for the coming year. First, a 3-day Youth Retreat to be attended by teen age boys from our parish, their fathers and other men from St. Peters. Second, the resurrection of the St. Peter's Shrove Tuesday Pancake Dinner. Additionally, our Brotherhood chapter intends to help channel volunteers from our parish to worthy projects conducted by groups such as Dietert Center and Habitat for Humanity. In addition, the Brotherhood intends to rekindle our efforts toward mentoring at B.T. Wilson and certain other area schools.

So, we men have a way to go to catch up with our women. But we have had a good start. We encourage our men who may not have already done so to give serious thought to becoming more active in parish affairs. Consider joining the Brotherhood or at least joining in some of the projects it will initiate this coming year. The men listed below are each members of the group and will be pleased to answer any questions you may have about our chapter.







Your remarkable life is happening right here, right now. You may not be able to see it – your life may seem predictable and your work insignificant until you look at your life as Frederick Buechner does.





The interviewees include Christians, Buddhists, Jews, and Muslims, as well as agnostics and atheists. Collectively, these engaging and intellectually rich conversations cover some of the most profound ideas and debates of our time: the Big Bang, the nature of consciousness, the meaning of God, and much more."





Fraction 2020-21 Transcripting
