Dear St. Peter's Family,

Recently, I was notified of my appointment to the Order of St. John by Her Majesty The Queen of England, Sovereign Head of The Most Venerable Order of the Hospital of St. John of Jerusalem. I first learned about the Order of St. John in a church history class, and now I am humbled to take my part in an ancient order still making a difference around the world.

The exact date when the Order of the Hospital of St. John of Jerusalem first came into being is unknown, although it was about 1170, when a hospice (a place of care) was established in Jerusalem for Christian pilgrims by monks from a neighboring Benedictine abbey. The hospice soon developed into a hospital and a religious order, with its brothers and sisters (commonly known as Hospitallers of St. John) providing care to the poor and sick of any faith. Over the course of several centuries, the Order grew in membership and eventually spread across the world. In 1888, when English Knights affiliated with the Order were carrying out very substantial charitable activities, Queen Victoria recognized the activities or "foundations" and incorporated the Order as it is known today.

Currently, St. John works in over thirty countries around the world providing community based first-aid, promoting health and well-being, and delivering community-based healthcare and support services. Every year, the services reach millions of people thanks to a volunteer base of more than two hundred thousand all sharing in the common vocation built on our motto and our mission "Pro Fide (for the faith), Pro Utilitate Hominum (in the service of humanity)" which embodies the Christian principles of our founders. I am certainly honored to join the longstanding Order of St. John, and my membership reminds me that each and every one of us shares in the worldwide mission of the church. As Episcopalians, we pray and serve with God's *world* in mind. Every Sunday, we pray for our community, the nation, *and* the world. We ought to pray, think, and act big. We *are* members of the one holy catholic (universal) and apostolic Church. So, yes, the Spirit empowers us to share in the miraculous ministry taking place in our local neighborhoods and across the globe. Let us keep the faith. Let us keep praying. And let us see how God might use us for the welfare of the world.

June Vestry Highlights

The Vestry met in Tucker Hall on Monday, June 21, 2021 at 5:30pm. Fr. Bert opened with a prayer, and following the prayer, a few members of the Vestry shared life and ministry moments.

Amy Richards had emailed the ECW report and the Junior Warden's report to the Vestry. Amy, the Junior Warden, reported on the following:

- St. Peter's School Bus Carport: Sent an email on June 14, 2021 asking Simpco for an update on installation timeline.
- Storage Unit Electrical, etc.: Waiting for KPUB to tie in the electrical service.
- Tree Removal: trees have been removed.
- Fire and Security System Bids: – have been submitted to the Finance Commission

The Rector and Vestry had a short discussion about replacing the trees that had been removed outside the office and near the school parking lot. Fr. Bert said he would follow up with his staff to see about getting a quote for new trees.

James Horne had emailed the Organ Rebuild Report to the Vestry. He entertained any questions the Vestry might have for David Miron, and James will continue to serve as a liaison for the Organ Rebuild Ad-Hoc Committee.

Mark Haufler, Senior Warden, offered a brief report to Vestry. Mark spoke to the Fire and Security System Proposal, that the Finance Commission has approved, and that our current contract expires on September 1, 2021. Guy and other staff members will follow up with the plans for our future fire and security service.

Mark Haufler stated that the electrical for the Storage Unit has been accomplished, in reference to Amy Richard's Junior Warden Report.

Fr. Bert reported to the Vestry. Fr. Bert shared more about his week serving as chaplain at Camp Capers Summer Camp. He served with the Rev. Ben Nelson from St. Mark's, San Marcos, and Brian and Abby Blacklock. The four of them served as the DCT (Dean-Chaplain-Teacher) team to Senior High Session A. He especially praised Abby and Brian for their solid teaching and ministry to the campers. Fr. Bert also reaffirmed the camping ministry in our Diocese and the lasting impact it has on children and youth across the state. Fr. Bert provided an update on the strategic planning process. In consultation with the Senior Warden, the Vision Planning Support Team is being formed to help with the pre-read information package that will inform visioning and planning, before, during and after the work sessions to come. The Vision Planning Support Team will meet with Reb Scarborough on Wednesday, June 23. Fr. Bert shared with the Vestry about his appointment to the Order of St. John, and he plans to share more about the Order of St. John with the entire parish in his Rock Road article.



Ted Whittier was on the agenda to present two American flags. Ted presented the two flags in memory of Betty's and his wedding anniversary. Ted also shared his heartfelt thanks for being an active member of our parish for the past twenty years or so.

The Vestry approved the minutes from the regular May meeting and several actions taken since the May meeting. On May 20, the Vestry approved to adopt the most recent guidelines from the Bishop's Office. The Vestry also chose to immediately communicate to the parish that fully vaccinated individuals are no longer required to wear a mask or physically distance indoors or outdoors on church premise, and masks and 6-foot distancing are expected and strongly encouraged for individuals who are not fully vaccinated, indoors. On June 1, the Vestry approved the expenditure for organ keyboards and the rebuilding of the organ console. On June 1, the Vestry approved to accept the proposal from Reb Scarborough and proceed with the strategic planning process.

The May financials had been emailed to the Vestry by the Controller, Kristie Keese. The financials had also been reviewed by the Finance Commission. We are 42% through this fiscal year, and the reports showed that our overall income was at 50% and expenses were at 41%. The financial report was approved by the Vestry.

Eric Maloney and Fr. Bert reported from the Reopening Committee. Eric Maloney reported that we are still seeing under 30 cases since the beginning of May comparing to where we were in January. Hospitalizations are at 7 today, but have been ranging from 4 to 7 each week average since early May. With the hospitalizations and the active cases, we are trying to monitor the variants. The variants have to be tested by DHS Lab in Austin, and Eric said that is what they are really watching for right now. Fr. Bert reported that he and other clergy participated in a roundtable discussion with Bishop Reed about what is working and what has been challenging with the latest guidelines from the Bishop's office. Finally, after consulting with the Senior Warden, Fr. Bert has asked Mickey Horany to chair the Reopening Subcommittee for the foreseeable future.

The Vestry and Rector closed their meeting with the Lord's Prayer, and the meeting was adjourned.

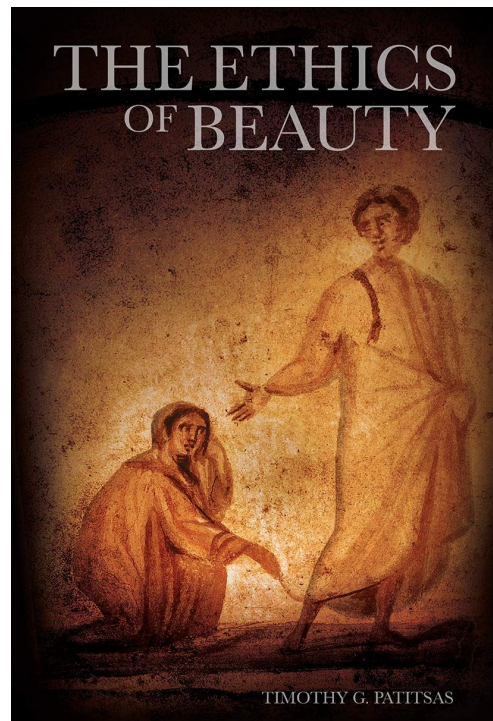

A Message from Father Mike...

The Ethics of Beauty

"Chaste and ardent eros for the Beautiful is the first task of human life, and falling in love with Beauty is the beginning of every adventure that matters..."

Dr. Timothy Patitsas teaches Ethics at Holy Cross Greek Orthodox Church School of Theology in Brookline, Massachusetts. I have just discovered his doorstop of a book (748 pages!), *The Ethics of Beauty* (2019, St. Nicholas Press, \$49.95). At this writing, I'm only about halfway into it. I cannot put it down! When I shared the book with Fr. Bert, I told him that it is, perhaps, the most important book I've ever read. It's unusual format--question and answer (long responses)--gives it a personal feel, like a great conversation with a trusted friend who will be really honest with you, transparent and kind. "Kind"; that's the word I'm groping for. "Kind" is how I experience most Orthodox theology and spirituality, and especially here. It lacks the preachy, judge-y, quick-fix system of rewards and punishments of so much in American religion.



The Ethics of Beauty's exalted vision of the transcendent God we worship somehow manages to humanize us in the best sense of the word (NOT self-esteem or self-actualization, but becoming truly ourselves in the crucified-and-risen Christ within his Church). It reminds me to counter the worst tendencies of the individualistic, tough-it-out, personalistic, selfish, sentimentalist religiosity today. No; Patitsas' vision is the Old Way of the early Church Fathers: the Church as a hospital for the help and healing of souls. That is really what is behind the parable of The Good Samaritan. Our trauma and aloneness is tenderly massaged back to health and life by the Great Physician (Jesus) who happens to have a great, well-staffed hospital (Church), whereby we patients (Christians) come out looking and feeling more like our true selves as we come to trust and fall in love with this Physician and love our sisters and brothers in the Church and world. This isn't "faith alone/ Christ alone/Scripture alone/(anything that's alone" religion. It's "love the Lord your God with all your heart, soul and mind--AND, your neighbor as yourself." God is never alone and neither are we. No one is ever saved alone. My Own Private Jesus isn't an option!

This book issues from Dr. Patitsas' personal interest and research with soldiers returning from war suffering PTSD, having seen (and perhaps committed) the ugliest, darkest, most damaging things imaginable, whose imprints upon their souls and bodies renders their lives living hells. He posits that what these hurting men and women need first and foremost is not Truth-first ethics (modern psychotherapeutic, repetitious recounts of deeds done, reliving and reliving the beastly world of war), nor do they need moralizing efforts to "move on" (they can't!). Also, Patitsas says they don't need the second

ethical duty of a Goodness-first approach, either (not yet!). What they (and we, too, if I'm reading the author correctly) need, of primary importance, is an encounter with the Beautiful-first ethics of God's love (eros), which we find in worship (which calls us out of ourselves towards transcendent Being); liturgy (which quietly, steadily, unemotionally, re-orders and anchors our passions/ desires/motives, preparing us for the Good); mild, healthy shame (confession/humility; not toxic, soul-crushing shame); spiritual friendship, solidarity and human accompaniment (Church relationships); and Sacraments (God's active presence and grace infused and ordered to our deification, holiness/ wholeness).

(From the back cover): Covering topics ranging from creation to political theory to the Jesus Prayer, including war, psychology, trauma, chastity, healthy shame, gender, marriage, hospitality, art, architecture, theology, economics, urban planning and complexity theory, *The Ethics of Beauty* lays out a worldview in which Beauty, Goodness and Truth are recognized as indispensable elements of the best possible human life."

It's a deep-dive tome, this magnificently kind book, almost as though one were touching the hem of Jesus' garment, finding healing in the depths, a Beautiful God from whom all blessings flow...

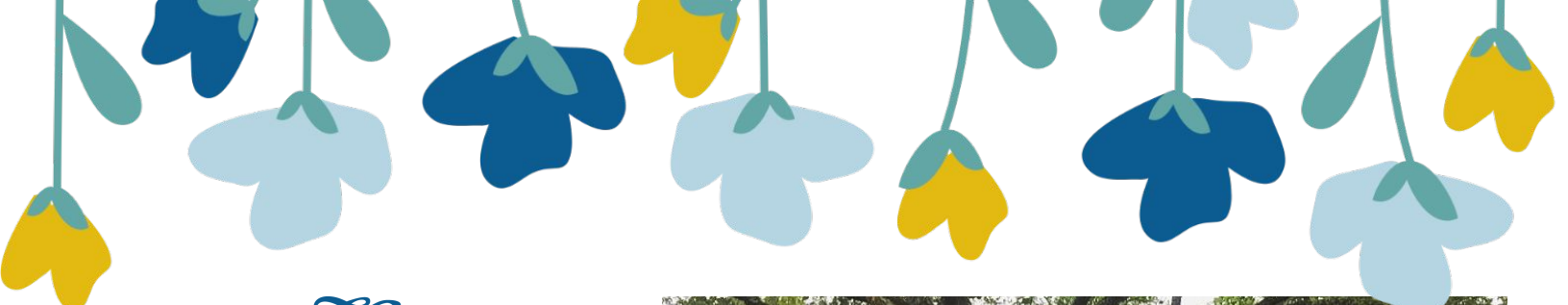

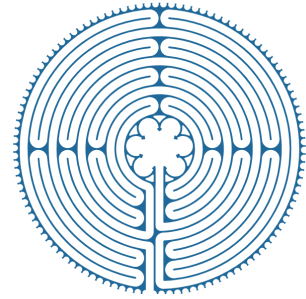

Lou Ann describes digital painting as, “the process of painting on a tablet and creating artwork digitally on a computer. This is done through painting software using a graphics tablet and pen with infinite choices of brushes, colors, and paint mediums such as oil, pastel, and chalk. Techniques require knowledge of art skills such as composition, perspective, light, and color theory. I started painting in 2010 and have taken many hours of in-person classes as well as webinars learning this process and improving my skills. It’s the challenge that keeps me interested. I painted the Labyrinth using digital oils.”

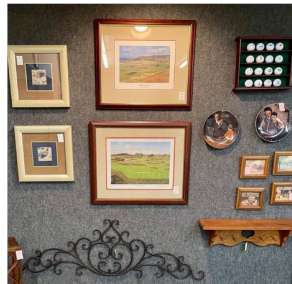

St. Jerome's Jots

For July's edition of the Rock Road we have book reviews from Victoria Wilson and Paula Karl.

From Victoria:

The Wolf Hall Trilogy by Hilary Mantel is a good follow up to my review of the biography of Martin Luther by Eric Metaxis, Fr. Stockton Williams' program on the history of the Book of Common Prayer and Leslie Williams' Emblem of Faith Untouched, her biography of Archbishop Thomas Cranmer. The titles in this trilogy are Wolf Hall, 2009, Bring Up the Bodies, 2012, and The Mirror and the Light, 2020. The historically accurate narrative chronicles the rise and fall of Thomas Cromwell against the backdrop of the Court of Henry VIII and the English Reformation. Though it is fiction, Hilary Mantel is an historian capable of describing the machinations of the court of Henry VIII with Anne Boleyn, Thomas More, Jane Seymour, the political and religious environment of the Reformation in Tudor England and on the Continent from 1485 to 1540. The first two titles won the Booker Prize in 2015 which is the leading literary prize in the English speaking world for fiction. In 2015, Masterpiece Theater produced a two season award winning drama based on the Mantel books entitled "Wolf Hall" starring Mark Rylance, It can be streamed on Amazon Prime or Netflix or is available on DVD.

From Paula:

THE BOOK OF FORGIVENESS by Desmond Tutu and his daughter Mpho Tutu who is a psychiatrist and priest. Bishop Tutu was a judge/conciliator on the Forgiveness panel of South Africa. His daughter has worked closely with him on that country-changing effort and also independently. The book takes the applicant/reader through the steps to true forgiveness and allows freedom on the other side. It is a true "how to" and I believe a way for us out of the miasma of the "Me, Too" movement and perhaps the rage held within the Black community and the guilt within the White. As I read this small tome I felt relief and gratitude as I was purged from pain inflicted both by me and others by living life. It is available at Butt-Holdsworth Library.

St. Jerome's Guild hopes you will come to the church library and see all the interesting titles available. Have a great July!

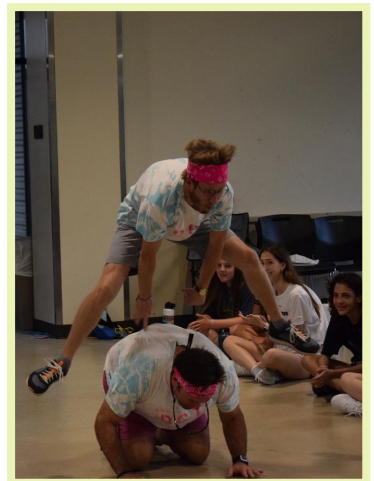

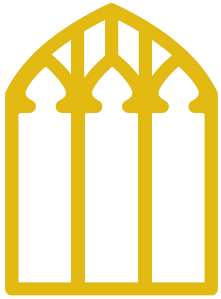

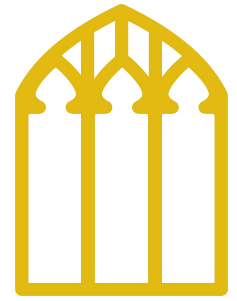

A Modified Return to Worship and Congregational Life:



Diocesan Protocols and Guidelines

Bishop Reed issued new guidelines providing us room to begin lifting certain restrictions and revising our protocols. In the days and weeks ahead, you will begin to hear about more changes to our protocols that will bring us closer to the full return to normal church life.

In terms of immediate changes, and in anticipation of Sunday worship, the Vestry has approved of the following revisions to our protocols:

- Fully vaccinated individuals are no longer *required* to wear a mask or physically distance indoors or outdoors on church premises.
- Masks and 6-feet distancing are expected and strongly encouraged for individuals who are *not fully vaccinated* indoors.
- We have resumed passing the offertory plates
- We are using the pew kneelers during worship.
- Almost all pews are now available for seating. A front section of the Nave will continue to offer space for distancing, should you wish.
- We are using the altar rail when taking Communion, and wine will be offered by intinction.

Other changes to our protocols will be made known as they are available.

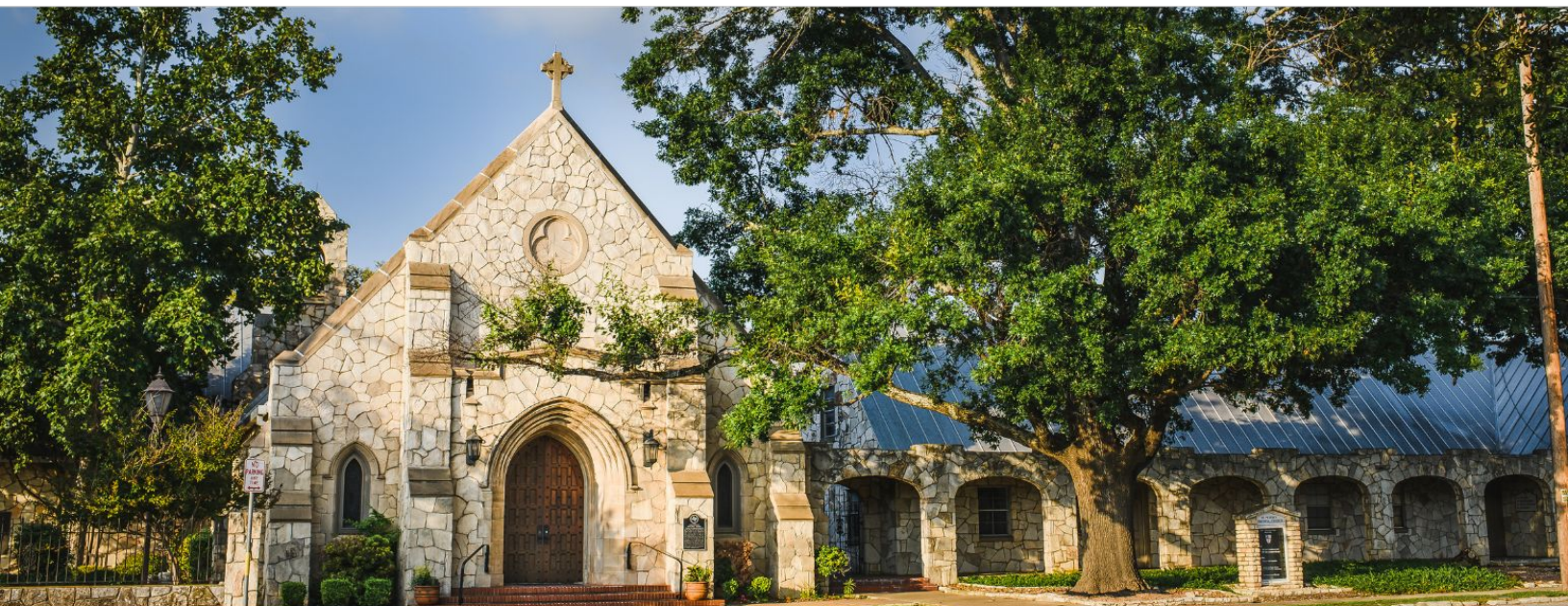

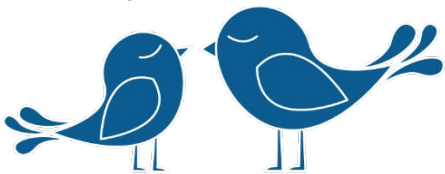
