June Vestry Highlights

The Vestry met via video conference on Monday, June 15, 2020 at 5:30pm. Fr. Bert opened the meeting with a prayers and a reading. A couple of members of the Vestry then shared life moments.

David Miron had prepared for the Vestry a detailed report on the progress of the organ rebuild. That report had been emailed to the Vestry ahead of time. David Miron was invited to the Vestry meeting to address his report and answer any questions from the Vestry.

David reported that basically he is building a new, more complete organ, adding parts from the donated organ by adding parts to the existing organ. By redesigning with additional pipes, the organ will not have complete sets of s sounds and will be much more versatile for hymn and choral accompaniments.

The shared 10Bit workshop where he began the organ rebuild last fall closed due to the Covid-19 pandemic; where he had been relying on their large equipment and laser cutter. In the past few months he has purchased equipment and adapted to workflow available space in his garage and patio. The cramped quarters and smaller tools slow the woodworking but he has a complete design and is making progress.

David reported that for congregational morale and his, he has decided to proceed out of the normal rebuilt sequence to connect the wind, wire the wind chests that are not installed, and put the pipes on them so that the part of the organ may be possibly played by the end of July. David reported that he is planning a short recital for when the work is done, which he will videotape for the church website. David said as he finishes major steps, he will send another report.

Following the organ rebuild update from David Miron, the Vestry approved the minutes from the May regular meeting.

The May financials had been emailed to the Vestry by the Controller, Kristie Keese. The financials had also been reviewed by the Finance Commission. We are 41% through with our budget year, and the reports showed that our overall income was at 49% and expenses were at 41%. Last week both the parish and the school deposited its first draw of the PPP Loan. The PPP Loan had an eight week forgiveness period, which has been extended to a twenty-four week forgiveness period. Kristie is working on the necessary forms to apply for the loan forgiveness. The financial report was approved by the Vestry.

On behalf of St. Peter's Episcopal School, Mark Haufler had emailed his report to the Vestry. The School Board met on June 8, 2020. Mark Haufler emailed the school board report prior to the meeting. The School Board met on June 8, 2020. The status of the PPP loan was discussed as it pertains to recent legislative changes approved by the House and Senate. Based on the most recent changes, it is not anticipated that the School will acquire any debt as a result of their portion of the PPP program.

David Martin, Junior Warden, reported to the Vestry. David reported on the following:

- Carpentry Work: This work is in progress. Siding has been repaired and painted on school west
 and east entry gables, and west church entry. Door frames at Vesting Room and adjacent classroom have been replaced and painted, and a gutter and down spot installed.
- Carpet replacement for hall and Ginny's office: Waiting on carpet so they can schedule the installation.
- Lighting: Contract with lighting consultant/supplier has been approved and lights and bulbs have been ordered for the Sanctuary. A local electrician, DW Electric will schedule a time to investigate existing circuiting in the Sanctuary to determine how to install the new lighting that will highlight the baptismal font and organ pipes

- Roof cleaning: A proposal was approved with Gilbert and Lawn Tree and Irrigation Services to clean the new porch and low slop roofs four times a year (roughly quarterly) for \$200.00 per cleaning. This will help keep leaves and debris out of the downspouts and extend the life of the roof.
- Items on the to do list: Painting, Carport for bus. David reported that they will soon get an estimate on the carport soon. Even though we probably won't have funding on that this year, we will go ahead and do some design work on the carport. David reported he is having Guy look around for any hail damage on campus, from the recent storms. We then get in touch with the insurance to see what can be done about it.
- Kristie Keese was also able to share an update on the damage from the recent storms. Kristie
 and Guy Scott walked the campus in order to survey the damage. Because there is damage on
 the bus and also damage on the utility trailer from the hail, they decided to go ahead and contact
 the insurance company. We have an insurance adjuster coming out to campus to assess the situation, particularly the roofs on our properties.

Mickey Horany, Senior Warden, reported to Vestry. Mickey Horany had emailed his report to the Vestry prior to the meeting. Mickey said that if you have not been attending modified in-person services yet, you can feel comfortable in doing so. He said it has been good to see parishioners again, even if it is behind the mask.

Since we are back in a modified way, Mickey said that we need to review our Vestry of the Day schedules and duties. We do not want anyone who feels uncomfortable with attending in-person services at this time to feel they have to do Vestry of the Day duties. He also reminded the Vestry of taking certain precautions with their duties.

Mickey reported on the fact that the DWTX has decided to help churches with the financial issues by offering some apportionment relief. All churches had their April apportionment cancelled. The Bishop and Executive Committee has also elected to forego the payment of apportionment for the summer months (May, June, July and August) for churches who can show financial hardship during this time. The Finance Commission feels that at this time, with our finances still in a sound position, we at St. Peter's should not submit for apportionment cancellation. However, the Commission along with the Vestry will continue to monitor our finances and pursue this relief if needed in the coming months.

Finally, Mickey thanked Fr. Bert, Fr. Mike and all the staff for the great job in getting us ready for the modified in-person worship, as well as continuing with the YouTube online services. availability. He also wanted to thank those who are serving during the modified services, ushers, lay readers, video operators, etc. Mickey extended his gratitude to all.

Fr. Bert reported to the Vestry. Fr. Bert shared his appreciation for the staff and all that were involved in our modified return to worship. He continues to hear from parishioners in "how safe" it feels when they come to in-person worship. He recognized the fact that many of us miss worshipping in our beautiful historic nave, but worshipping in Tucker Hall remains to be helpful with the *modified* form of worship. Fr. Bert invited any sort of feedback from the Vestry members who have been attending the in-person worship. Based on what he sees and feedback received, Fr. Bert does believes our online services continue to improve as we are we are in a new space. We remain to be nimble in the new environment.

Fr. Bert has begun to reach out to families to talk about burials, as we have a number of burials to do, and has begun that work to reach out to families of the deceased and schedule services.

Fr. Bert reported that he had contacted the diocesan offices to inquire about the possibility of reopening the Cottage Shop, which is an outreach ministry that meets a need in our community. As we know, all other in-person events have been suspended, but he felt inclined to reach out to the Bishop's office to see if we could open the outreach ministry of the Cottage Shop, with our volunteers following certain protocols for their health and the safety of those visiting the Cottage Shop. Fr. Bert received a quick response from the bishop's office that they are currently working on guidelines for the next phase of reopening. Subsequent to Fr. Bert's inquiry, all members of the Diocese were notified that the diocesan office will share guidelines for Phase "2B" within the week of June 15. Those guidelines will be useful to know how and when any other in-person gatherings and ministries may resume in the parish.

Fr. Bert also shared data with the Vestry in regards to parish openings across the Diocese. As of Sunday, June 14, about half of the parishes in the Diocese of West Texas have returned to in-person worship. Fr. Bert remains in conversation with his colleagues in the Diocese, and our parish is seeing similar trends in terms of limited in-person attendance with others staying at home to participate in the online worship.

Fr. Bert also reported that he and Brian are planning an online version of Vacation Bible School. They have reached to the Rev. Sam Hunnicutt, and our parish will partner with Trinity, Junction to have a partnered VBS. We know everybody will enjoy seeing and hearing from Fr. Sam, and it would be a healthy partnership amongst two parishes in the Diocese. More details to come on VBS.

Finally, Fr. Bert shared with the Vestry that in the past Ted Whittier and Betty Whittier had given an American flag to St. Peter's on Flag Day and in thanksgiving of their wedding anniversary. Recently, Ted gave a three by five foot American flag to the church again this year in honor of Flag Day and in thanksgiving for his anniversary. The Vestry expressed its appreciation for the gift.

Under Old Business, Fr. Bert reported on the new video system. Following direction from the Vestry, Fr. Bert, Dave Weekley, and David Martin met via video conference to discuss the project. After having their questions answered, and discussing the project with Brian Blacklock, the group decided to move forward in working with Aaron Yates on the project. Fr. Bert has already reached out Aaron in order to take nest steps with project to install permanent (and inconspicuous) cameras in the historic nave so we as a parish can continue to provide our worship services online.

The Vestry and Rector closed their meeting with the Lord's Prayer. The meeting was then adjourned.

The next regular meeting will be Monday, August 17, at 5:30pm in the Multipurpose Room of Tucker Hall (or by video conference). As always, anyone in the parish is welcome to attend. If you wish to be on the agenda and speak, however, please notify the Rector no later than the previous Tuesday, August 11, when he writes the agenda and then sends the agenda to the Vestry.

LIGHT CAN KILL THE VIRUS

If you are reading this because the title made you hopeful that sunlight can cure Covid-19, I am sorry to disappoint. The World Health Organization has this to say about that: "Exposing yourself to the sun or to temperatures higher than 77F degrees DOES NOT prevent the coronavirus disease. You can catch COVID-19, no matter how sunny or hot the weather is. Countries with hot weather have reported cases of COVID-19."

So, if I have disappointed you with these revelations about light, I feel compelled to restore "the Light's" reputation as a virus killer. According to Richard Rohr in his book, "The Universal Christ", "..light is not so much what you directly see as that by which you see everything else."

Rohr further states the following: "Scientists have discovered that what looks like darkness to the human eye is actually filled with tiny particles called neutrinos, slivers of light that pass through the entire universe. Apparently, there is no such thing as total darkness anywhere, even though the human eye thinks there is. John's Gospel was more accurate than we realized when it described Christ as "a light that darkness cannot overcome (1:5). Knowing that the inner light of things cannot be eliminated or destroyed is deeply hopeful." He continues: "..the Christ Mystery is not a one time event, but an ongoing process throughout time— as constant as the light that fills the universe."

So, if we stop to consider what Rohr has presented above then maybe "The Light" can cure the virus. Maybe it can cure the "virus" of fear over Covid 19, the virus of loneliness and economic stress caused by the Coronavirus, the virus of division in our country due to recent events, etc.. You name the virus and I suspect "The Light" can be the cure. I am willing to try it, are you?

MAGDALENE HOUSE UPDATE

A couple of times lately I have run into parishioners at HEB, in our masks, and they have asked me what I am doing these days. If one of the things I mention is working with Magdalene House, they always express surprise that there still is a Magdalene House. They thought it was closed and did not realize it was still thriving, and, indeed, has for the past six months housed and ministered with two women who were victims of sextrafficking. And I am still slowly working on my part-time practical theology doctoral degree through Ridley Hall, Cambridge, with Kerrville's Magdalene House as the research project.

Some of you know the story, too long to go into detail about here, of Kathy Bogie receiving the vision to begin Magdalene House at the Diocesan Council in 2014. Then, as she and Art were contemplating a move home to Tulsa, and experienced a car wreck, and other medical issues, she received a further vision from a seemingly random encounter with a young man (she rightly says "angel") in the Pacific Northwest. He told her not to be concerned about Magdalene House; it would continue and grow in a way she did not expect. The very day after she returned home, she received a call from Chae Spencer of Mercy Gate Ministries. Kathy saw that as what the angel must have "seen," and, long story short, after much negotiation, our Magdalene House board merged with Mercy Gate Ministries.

Mercy Gate Ministries (MGM) is now the parent of Magdalene House, and it is still called Magdalene House (MH). Dave Weekley and I are the two members of the original, mostly St. Peter's MH Board who participate now on the MGM Board. A new Tiny House replaces the trailer, and that is where our MH Manager, Angela Herrera, lives. She is there much of the evening, and all night. This is working so well the Board is now planning to place more Tiny Houses on the property so they can be "transition homes" for women graduating from the one-year program, but still needing or wanting some support.

The Magdalene House Director of Operations, Gwen Ferguson, is on site much of the day. (Some of you know her husband, Dennis, who is Executive Director of BCFS). Chae Spencer, MGM Executive Director, is also at MH much of the day, and Karla Solomon, a sex trafficking survivor, is there two or three days a week. Our program is one year long, in four phases of generally about three months each. Our two current residents are moving into stage three now. Unfortunately, because of COVID-19 (of course), some of the planned programing, such as with Christian Women's Job Corps, has been postponed.

I have been especially pleased that MGM is also involved in the prevention of and rescue from sex trafficking, as well as in healing and restoration. We are the leading agency dealing with sex trafficking in our region and are becoming state-wide educators, with continuing efforts in education for schools, airports, law enforcement, child -serving agencies, first responders, and community influencers. In 2019, our training and education programs reached over 1800 people. Directly through MGM's initiatives and training at the San Antonio International Airport, one young woman was recently rescued! Praise God! We currently have invitations to train and educate with the FBI, Houston's Annual Airport Conference, Texas Department of Licensing and many other organizations.

Karla Solomon and Aubri Reed, Director of Development, are on Governor Abbott's Child Sex Trafficking Team, and they and the MGM Board have started the Kerr Care Coordination Team, which brings together law enforcement, K-STAR, Child Advocacy, MGM, and others. This effort has developed a rapid-response team for at-risk and identified youth under 18 years of age in our region. We have already been involved in some tragic cases covered in the Kerrville Daily Times. Thus, this team models a continuum of care from identification, to rescue, to healing, to restoration.

I hope this brief introduction to some of the current ministry of Magdalene House of Mercy Gate Ministries has helped you realize that Kathy Bogie's vision, which spread through St. Peter's Church, has blossomed, by God's grace, into an even larger and more active ministry than we could have expected. It now involves many members of our Kerr County community, including law enforcement and other non-profit agencies. Please keep Magdalene House in your thoughts and prayers. St. Peter's--through lots of hard work and monetary support over several years, you have planted the seed and started a wonderful, crucial Christian ministry that still lives on and is thriving!

A Message from Father Mike...

"You cannot be too gentle, too kind. Shun even to appear harsh in your treatment of each other. Joy, radiant joy, streams from the face of him who gives and kindles joy in the heart of him who receives. All condemnation is from the devil. Never condemn each other...Instead of condemning others, strive to reach inner peace. Keep silent, refrain from judgment. This will raise you above the deadly arrows of slander, insult, and outrage and will shield your glowing hearts against all evil." (St. Seraphim of Sarov).

The secular world tells us that by voting, by politics, by engineering and technology, by science, by violence and war, the future will be saved. I believe this to be a lie. I believe it to be a very seductive lie--one that seems obvious to many--such that questioning it makes many people think that I must be making some mistake (Father Stephen Freeman, Orthodox priest).

I grew up talking politics. My family didn't shun conversation around either politics or religion. We were Republicans and Democrats, Baptists and Catholics and nothings. My father voted for Richard Nixon in 1960, but my mother didn't; instead, she pulled the lever for JFK because "he's just so handsome." It was the only time she did so, presumably because later Democratic candidates failed to live up to her high and discerning standards!

We watched the nightly news narrated by Walter Cronkite throughout all the turbulent 60s and 70s: Vietnam, Selma, I Have a Dream, assassinations, campus protests, Kent State, burnings and lootings, Civil Rights Act, Watergate--all of it. I had a great-uncle in County government, someone dubbed a "Yellow Dog Democrat", beloved by all voters. My children are distantly related somewhere, somehow, through their mother's family tree to Jefferson Davis, the President of the Confederacy. None of us ever knew that until they were grown.

My eldest cousin is in possession of pre-Civil War legal documents indicating that some of our distant Southern relations were slave owners and had wills that would allocate which particular enslaved persons would go with which relatives upon the death of our family members. I learned this with surprise a mere decade ago. It was never, ever mentioned in later generations, possibly out of shame.

My formative years were surrounded by civil conversation, strong and diverse opinions and respect for differences. We didn't have to keep our mouths and minds shut when we were around someone who disagreed. In fact, I remember a lot of laughter, good humor and teasing. Perhaps my memory is faulty or over-sanitized all these decades later. Mostly, though, we just voted and left it at that.

I have my own strong feelings, ideas and opinions, but I made a decision long ago that I wouldn't be a "political priest" in the pulpit and parish. I believe the Gospel transcends and supersedes all my other attachments. I've been around some political priests and I find them nauseous. Their overt activism turns me off and shuts me down. Because when a priest gets political fever, I find it's usually just their political issues being touted, mine and yours be darned. But most importantly for me, the Gospel seems to get lost in the heat of partisanship.

To me, Jesus seems the least political and the most political religious figure of all time. He never sought nor held office or seemed to espouse a contemporary cause. Yet, his Gospel message upends, corrects, overturns and casts down all that is systemically false and evil, or else, it brings forth and builds up whatever is righteous, just and loving: Love God wholeheartedly. Love your neighbor as yourself. If we do that, we simply can't go wrong, harm another child of God or become someone who hates and destroys.

I go to church to become the kind of person I see in Jesus, the kind of person who tries to do to others what I would have them do to me. I want to be a person of peace like the Prince of Peace. It's very often difficult. Pray for me.




