

When the day of Pentecost had come, the disciples were all together in one place. And suddenly from heaven came a sound like the rush of a violent wind, and it filled the entire house where they were sitting (Acts 2:1-2).

Dear St. Peter's Family,

Over the course of this past school year, we had to get creative in how we would bring chapel to our St. Peter's school children. Recently, when Brian Blacklock (with his guitar in hand) and I visited individual classrooms and brought chapel to each class gathered in their respective rooms, it gave me an opportunity to reflect upon the Pentecost story I shared with them.

In the Acts of the Apostles, we hear what happened after Jesus ascended into heaven. By the time of Jesus' ascension, the disciples had been on somewhat of a rollercoaster ride in their discipleship. Jesus called the disciples to follow him, he died, he was raised from the dead, he was with them again for forty days, and then he ascended into heaven. The disciples must have been thinking, "What comes next?" In the story after the ascension, the disciples were gathered together in "one place," likely wondering what might come next in life's adventure with Jesus. The disciples were gathered in a house, and even though it was not the holy Temple in Jerusalem, perhaps the house was a familiar place to them, a place that gave them some sort of comfort in the uncertainty of what comes next.



It was such a gift to once again share the Pentecost story with our St. Peter's school children. Now in a typical year, the children and I would gather in our beautiful nave and sanctuary to hear that sacred story. But, we were gathered in one place, in their classroom, a place familiar to them, and the Spirit was no less present to us. I shared the story, and the children who have been learning Bible stories and singing chapel songs all school year stood up and danced and sang the songs like it was Pentecost. So, what comes next for all of us? Wait on the Lord. He is always good on his promises. He will show up. Just wait and see.

April Vestry Highlights

The Vestry met in Tucker Hall on Monday, April 19, 2021 at 5:30pm. Fr. Bert opened the meeting with a prayer for the season of Easter. Following the prayer, a few members of the Staff and Vestry shared life and ministry moments.

The Vestry approved the minutes from the March regular meeting and the action taken on April 13 via email. On April 13, the Vestry approved two updates to the protocols for the ministry Cottage Shop. The Cottage Shop can be open more than two days per week and the volunteers in the Cottage Shop can now make the dressing room available to the clientele.

The March financials had been emailed to the Vestry by the Controller, Kristie Keese. The financials had also been reviewed by the Finance Commission. After the first quarter of the fiscal year, the reports showed that our overall income was at 31% and expenses were at 25%. Kristie also reported that the Church and School has received the second PPP loan proceeds in the amount of \$209,000, with \$106,000 designated for the school and \$103,000 designated for the parish. The financial report was approved by the Vestry.

On behalf of the School Board, Mark Haufler reported to the Vestry. He presented the following highlights from the School Board meeting on April 12, 2021:

- Fr. Bert opened the meeting with prayer
- Current enrollment is 141. There are only a handful of openings for 2021-2022
- The school has a net profit of \$44,053 for 7 months ending March 31, 2021. Cash remains very strong at \$500,000+. The balance sheet of March 31 reports \$409,751 in cash which is exclusive of PPP funds of \$106,000
- Based on the strong cash position of the school, the board voted to approve the transfer of \$250,000 to a
 new Unrestricted Endowment account in order to realize some return on what to date have been funds not
 earning any interest
- The staff have been receiving COVID vaccines over the past couple of weeks
- Year-end bonuses for all school staff were approved.
- The board approved the following individuals to serve as new Board members, subject to Vestry's election:

Polly Horany – 1 year term

Justin MacDonald - 3 year term

Barbara Cordova – 3 year term

Caroline Key - 3 year term

Betty Mosty – 2 year term

- The newly created McCaskill Scholarship has offered, on an annual basis, to match up to \$12,000 of scholarship funds raised by the school
- Upcoming School Activities:

o Week of the Young Child April 12-16 o Mother's Day Campaign April 6-May 9 o Scholarship deadline April 16

Mother's Day Chapel May 5, view on Church YouTube channel

• The next School Board meeting is May 10 at 12:30 p.m. in Tucker Hall

On behalf of the ECW Report, Amy Richards reported that the vote was unanimous in favor of refurbishing the kneelers and work should commence soon (if not already). Amy reported that the next ECW General Meeting will be May 6, 2021 at 10:30 a.m. The program will be presented by Cindy Bachman on the Labyrinth. Boxed lunches will be served.

On behalf of the Organ Rebuild Ad-Hoc Committee, James Horne reported to the Vestry. James Horne reported that that David Miron is going to do some work on the organ, and will not be able to play the organ on either May 2^{nd} or the 9^{th} . David is trying to work on the noise from the blower, and has consulted other organ technical persons, and will be trying 3 of the 4 suggestions he received. James asked David how many pipes we are adding to the organ, and David replied 976 pipes were added for a total of 2,600 pipes. James stated that the organ at the National Cathedral has over 10,000 pipes.

Amy Richards, Junior Warden, reported to the Vestry. Amy reported on the following:

- 1. Painting of the interior of the Sanctuary: The Vestry has decided to table this project and revisit in the Fall
- 2. St. Peter's School Bus/Carport: David Martin made a recommendation, after looking at the site of the size and type of structure needed. The new quote is \$3,145 from Simpco. It Vestry approves the increased cost we will order structure and work on permit from the city. According to the Finance Commission, since the amount is below \$5,000, there is no need for Vestry approval for the amount of \$3,145. David Martin will help with getting the permit. (see attached bid from Simpco). Amy Richards moved to increase the amount to \$3,145 for the bus carport, Amy Best seconded and it passed. Amy Richards will check with David Martin to see if there is any ground preparation needed prior to installation of the carport.
- **3.** Burst pipes from Storm: All work/repairs have been made.
- **4.** Storage Unit Electrical: Guy is getting a revised bid from DW Electric for the electrical work for the storage building. Provided the new quote is not significantly higher than what was quoted a year ago, Guy will schedule the work. Stephen Drane has offered to help on some of the interior wiring to save some money. There is \$3,300 remaining from the original budget to complete this project and it doesn't appear that it will finish significantly over budget, if at all. Guy stated that it is more than likely weeks away before this work is complete.
- Multipurpose A/C Unit: Compressor went out and needed to be replaced. Guy reached out to Lee Underwood to have it replaced. Amy Richards reported that we have a bid of \$4,850 for the replacement of the A/C unit. (which includes delivery, installation, parts and labor). Since it is under \$5,000 no Vestry approval is needed. The unit has been order and will be replaced soon. (Lee Underwood bid attached)
- 6. Church Security System: Our church security system is out of date and needs to be updated. Kristie Keese reported that the Security Company will no longer service our system, saying that we need a totally new system. Kristie reported that she was trying to research some information on the system and could not find a contract, and that the only information she found went back to 2006. The company stated that they are going to have to drop new lines, which makes it sound expensive. Guy will be contacting other companies for quotes and will provide an update to the Jr. Warden before the next Vestry meeting in May.



Mark Haufler, Senior Warden, offered a brief report to Vestry. Mark enjoyed the visit with the Bishop, and he felt like we have had a good spring so far.

Fr. Bert reported to the Vestry. Fr. Bert first shared a note from the family of Michelle Tapscott. The family wrote Fr. Bert and the whole church saying, "Please accept our most sincere and heartfelt thanks for the kindness and grace St. Peter's Church extended to our family as we bade an earthly farewell to our beloved Michelle Tapscott. We are so thankful that Michelle crossed paths with your blessed church that so graciously accepted her and loved her as a child of God. We pray that the Lord will continue to reward you abundantly, bless the work of your hands and that whatever you touch will prosper."

Fr. Bert mentioned that we had three big Sundays since the last Vestry Meeting: Easter Day, the parish picnic on the Second Sunday of Easter, and the Bishop's visit on the Third Sunday of Easter. All of these Sunday services were well-attended, and Fr. Bert felt like the parish picnic must have been a highlight for many of us in this year so far. The weather was perfect for the picnic, we had a large turnout for the service with baptisms in the river, and many parishioners commented on the renewed energy at the picnic. Fr. Bert also shared his gratitude to the Eastland family for hosting the picnic at Camp Mystic. On behalf of the parish, Fr. Bert has sent a thank you note to the Eastlands.

In following up to his report at the last meeting when he touched on a possible long-range planning process, Fr. Bert has since reached out to a congregational development consultant by the name of Reb Scarborough. Fr. Bert knew Reb in the Diocese of Texas, and since 1994, Reb has worked with parishes, congregations, and dioceses to convert their vision into an actionable plan and develop the organizational capacity to realize their vision. Fr. Bert spoke with Reb over the phone and has invited Reb to visit Kerrville in order to get a better sense in how we might want to engage with Reb for our long-range planning purposes at St. Peter's.

Fr. Bert reminded the Vestry that we all can expect to hear from the Bishop's Office within the next week in regards to updated COVID-19 guidelines, especially now that we are seeing more positive trends in the pandemic.

Fr. Bert reported that the McCaskill Scholarship Committee met last month and decided to match up to \$12,000 of scholarship funds raised by St. Peter's Episcopal School.

Finally, Fr. Bert reported that when the Reopening Subcommittee met last week via Zoom, he shared some of Brian's and his ideas about an in-person Vacation Bible School this summer. The Subcommittee was in full support of an in-person VBS, and Fr. Bert will take some of the Subcommittee's ideas back to Brian for the planning of a safe, fun, and formative VBS. Fr. Bert and Brian have set the date of VBS to be the week of June 28, and Brian will publicize information about the program in the May Rock Road.

Under new business, the Vestry elected the following persons the School Board: Polly Horany (1 year term); Justin MacDonald (3 year term); Barbara Cordova (3 year term); Caroline Key (3 year term); and Betty Mosty (2 year term).

The Vestry and Rector held a brief executive session and then closed their meeting with the Lord's Prayer. The meeting was adjourned.

The next regular meeting will be Monday, May 17 at 5:30pm in Tucker Hall. As always, anyone in the parish is welcome to attend. If you wish to be on the agenda and speak, however, please notify the Rector no later than the previous Tuesday, May 11, when he writes the agenda to be sent to the Vestry.



Old Friends, New Beginnings

One of my favorite aspects of working at an established church is being able to witness friendships that span decades and, in some instances, generations. Leading up to our annual parish picnic at Camp Mystic, I stumbled upon a few photo albums buried under years of random artifacts thrown into a forgotten church closet. This album was a goldmine of memories from past picnics: smiling faces, mountains of food, retro wardrobes, canoes and even an armada of yellow rubber duckies on the loose, floating effortlessly down the old Guadalupe.

I couldn't help but smile as I observed these colorful memories from St. Peter's past, despite being taken decades prior to my arrival. This smile was quickly overtaken by anxiety as I realized it was now my job to re-create the post lunch entertainment for this well established parish celebration. Protocols. Masks. Social distancing... how were we ever going to enjoy ourselves with the challenges that 2021 has so ungraciously bestowed?

Fast forward to April 11th, 2021. It was approximately 12:37pm. The service was a success! Three young children were welcomed into our church family through the holy sacrament of baptism. Lunch was a smorgasbord of deliciousness thanks to Calvin Smajstrla, Richard Eastland and the Camp Mystic staff. As the meal wound down, I figured it was time to rally the troops for a group game or two. After all, it was up to me to make sure that *lasting memories* were cast in the hearts and minds of our families in attendance. So I made my way to the mess hall porch to survey the riverfront and conjure up a plan...

As I surveyed the grass below, I realized that I had it all wrong! It wasn't a clever game of organized chaos that would create the lasting memories - it was the smiling faces in attendance! The warm sun and cool spring breeze definitely helped, but the key to ensuring lasting memories was not found in the hours of preparation but in each other: you, me and the rest of our church family. We were together and that is all that was needed!



There is something special that happens when we show up. The Bible talks about this phenomenon in Hebrews 10:24-25. We are told to not give up meeting together, as some are in the habit of doing, but to encourage one another, and all the more as we see the Day approaching!

God, in his infinite wisdom, has chosen to use the Church as his vessel to bestow his grace upon our lives. Despite our brokenness and propensity for messing things up, God dispenses his grace through the meeting of his people and the rather ordinary means found in Eucharist, baptism, and the preaching of the Word: Church!

The concept of Sabbath, or keeping Sunday set apart for the Lord, has been neatly stored in a forgotten closet, and decades of knick-knacks, sports, busy-ness and the like have buried any trace of this forgotten priority. When you throw a pandemic on top of that heap, it may seem that all hope has been lost for the Church. But friends, there is hope! God has chosen to use the Church, and no progression of culture, busy-ness, or pandemic will usurp her power! "His Kingdom come. His will be done. On earth as it is in Heaven."

There is something special that happens when we gather. It was SO good to be with you at the church picnic. I hope to see you this Sunday morning!



From Maggie:

We would be glad to bring you Holy Communion at your convenience. You are an integral member of our church family, and we want you to be able to share in our sacramental life at St. Peter's.




