Dear St. Peter's Family,







We will continue to offer meaningful and uplifting *in-person* worship, following our protocols. We will offer Holy Eucharist Rite I at 8:00am in the church nave. We will offer Holy Eucharist Rite II at 9:15am in Tucker Hall, and we intend to make the 9:15am service welcoming to families.

We will also offer a *virtual* Holy Eucharist Rite II service at 11:15am available at our YouTube Channel. It is important to note that the live-streamed service at 11:15am will not be an in-person worship service, and the service will be live-streamed from the church nave. The purpose of the 11:15am service is to provide a meaningful Sunday morning experience specifically tailored for the online congregation which is the current majority of our congregation. The clergy and a limited number of worship leaders will carry out the service to be live-streamed at our YouTube Channel.

In this edition of the Rock Road, you can read about new online Christian Formation offerings for adults (see pages 5 and 6). I encourage ministry leaders to continue to meet virtually until we have a plan approved by the Vestry and Bishop Reed for more in-person gatherings. We are going into the fall with flexible plans, and once we are able to safely turn more of our virtual gatherings into in-person gatherings, we will do so. The church has never been "cancelled" or "closed." Yes, we have had to adapt in this new abnormal, and yet we stand firm in our commitment to the mission before us. He is with us even now; so let us continue to know Christ and make him known to others.

Vestry Highlights

The Vestry met via video conference on Monday, August 17, 2020 at 5:30pm. Fr. Bert opened the meeting with a prayer for teachers and our schools. A couple of members of the Vestry then shared life moments.

The Vestry approved the minutes from the June regular meeting and other actions taken in the month of July. Those actions included electing Justin MacDonald to the Rock of St. Peter's Endowment Board, changing the name of the apartments to MacDonald Manor, and approving the protocols and opening date for St. Peter's Episcopal School.

The July financials had been emailed to the Vestry by the Controller, Kristie Keese. The financials had also been reviewed by the Finance Commission. We are 58% through with our budget year, and the reports showed that our overall income was at 63% and expenses were at 59%. The financial report was approved by the Vestry.

On behalf of St. Peter's Episcopal School, Mickey Horany had emailed his report to the Vestry. The School Board met on August 17, 2020. The faculty and administrators have returned to campus with new protocols in place. The administrators and faculty are ready to open school and have backup plans, if the need arises. At the time of this report, the school has five openings for students. The School Director Janet Boutin was also present in the Zoom Vestry meeting. Janet thanked the Vestry for their leadership and assistance. Janet also reported that she applied for a grant to acquire PPE equipment for the school, and was able to acquire the supplies needed. Janet reported that Open House may be on YouTube, as well as the Christmas Program, stating she did not want to cancel any of the programs at this time.

David Martin, Junior Warden, reported to the Vestry. David reported on the following:

- Miscellaneous Carpentry/painting: This is complete.
- HVAC: An air conditioner that serves two classrooms in the school has been replaced. Another classroom unit
 has some refrigerant leaks and Lee Underwood is looking at it.
- Hail Damage: The May 27 storm did some damage to various buildings on St. Peter's campus, most of it is fairly minor. The insurance company provided a lengthy report. The standing seam metal roof's had some dents/dings, but this is considered cosmetic damage and is not covered by insurance. The insurance company provided payment to replace the Shelton Hall membrane roof and the apartment complex carport roof. The fiberglass shingle roof for the school courtyard sandbox structure needs replacing. Insurance money was previously received for this, so it is recommended to replace this too. I recommend we move forward to replace these three roofs.
- Audio Visual work for streaming church services: There are several pieces of work that comprise this project:
 - 1. Hill Country Telephone Company (HCTC) will provide the fiber for internet service from the office to the church nave.
 - 2. DW Electric has dug a trench and run conduit underground from the office to the school building so that the fiber can run underground in conduit.
 - 3. Aaron Yates is providing the hardware and software and set up of the audio visual equipment for the digital recording and streaming.
 - 4. Seth Weatherford is building a wood finished screen and countertop to conceal the "mission control" center, located behind the choir areal
 - 5. Nick Boland will run the Cat 6 cable from mission control center to the two camera locations (preferably in the crawl space below the church), and set up the video equipment in the new booth.

Lighting:

- 1. Next week, DW Electric will work on installing new circuits for the new lighting that will highlight the Nave baptismal font and organ pipes.
- 2. The lighting consultant will follow up with installation of those lights and additional bulbs.
- Carport for Bus: A preliminary schematic plan has been proposed, and will be reviewed by the school and appropriate personnel and committees, and an estimate will follow.
- Interior Sanctuary painting: This will follow sometime after the A/V and lighting work in the Sanctuary are complete.

- Church van hail damage: The van was taken in to have the roof prepped and painted, but upon closer inspection, the body shop said the roof had more significant damage. The body shop will contact the insurance company to discuss the additional work based on the new assessment, and we will see if the insurance amount will change.
- **New altar for Tucker Hall:** Stephen Drane created a very beautiful handmade wood altar and liturgical accessories, which are being used in Tucker Hall for the current services. Great job!

Mickey Horany, Senior Warden, reported to Vestry. Mickey Horany had emailed his report to the Vestry prior to the meeting. Mickey reported that back to school plans are well underway and we are anxiously waiting to see how that goes not only at St. Peter's but all KISD and area schools. The Bishop has sent detailed information on the next phase of reopening and allowing more in person gathering. Mickey reported that both he and Fr. Bert have discussed what that may mean to us presently, and in the near future, specifically in regards to possible the re-opening of the Cottage Shop, 12 Step meetings, and other in-person ministries and fellowship. Mickey reported, in his and Fr. Bert's conversations, we have concluded we need to see how the school openings work out and that may help guide us on how to proceed. That is, if in-person school is successful with no surge in positive cases in those settings then it would signal that moving forward with more gatherings may be warranted and safe. Mickey stated, and of course, the opposite results may signal continued caution is needed. Mickey said that we will wait a short time and see.

Mickey stated it was reported previously we continue to be in a sound financial position. We are very grateful to the faith-fulness of our parishioners with their tithes and offerings during this time. Mickey reported that both he and Fr. Bert feel some of that is a result of the positive response to our "Taking the Next Step" generosity campaign last fall. Mickey stated that as we remember there was an emphasis on the "spiritual nature" of stewardship and "the need of the giver versus the need of the Church to receive". Mickey stated that we want to continue that message this fall, which is just around the corner. Mickey stated, that in that regard Fr. Bert has spoken to Hiram Wilson and he has agreed to chair the effort. Mickey reported that we will definitely use a devotional similar to the last one in our campaign. Mickey stated that he and Fr. Bert will be meeting with Hiram to flesh out how the fall effort will work, and Mickey is sure there will be opportunities for the Vestry to be involved.

Mickey wished to thank those members who have stepped up to help in the in-person services as ushers and taking of the collections. Mickey said he will pass out the Vestry of the Day schedule as a reminder of who is on duty in the coming months. Mickey stated, again during this modified time we hope whoever is comfortable being in Church will be on duty, but all the rest of us will step up wherever needed. Mickey thanked all for their continued faithful service.

Fr. Bert reported to the Vestry. Fr. Bert wanted to share his gratitude to Stephen Drane for his gifts to the church which include the altar, the credence table, the missal stand, the candlesticks, and the processional cross we are now using in Tucker Hall. All of these things were made from one pecan tree. Also, the cross we use for the adoration of the cross on Good Friday was made from the same pecan tree. The tree comes from Stephen's childhood home. We can all feel blessed by these furnishing, and Stephen's fine craftsmanship.

Fr. Bert wanted to speak to some of the plans for fall, the worship and the programs. He reported in terms of worship his plan is to go back to three services, with the third service being a strictly virtual service (see the cover article for more details). Fr. Bert reported that he has plans for Adult Christian Formation at the 10:15 a.m. time, and he will partner with Sam Hunnicutt at Trinity Junction for a couple of offerings (see pages X and Y for more details). Fr. Bert reiterated what Mickey had said about plans more additional gatherings for in-person formation and fellowship. Fr. Bert also stated that he would be meeting with Brian Blacklock this week to discuss ideas for our children's and youth ministry. He and Brian will continue with virtual Children's Chapel and discuss other ideas for gatherings, if and when we are able to lift some of our current restrictions.

When the parish was given an opportunity to develop a plan to return to a modified form of worship, a subcommittee was formed to develop the plan. The subcommittee includes Fr. Bert, Mickey Horany (Senior Warden), David Martin (Junior Warden), Richard Mosty (Chancellor), and Eric Maloney (Chair of the Safe Campus Committee). Eventually, the subcommittee will develop a plan for more additional in-person gatherings and present the plan to the Vestry for approval and submission to the bishop's office.

Under New Business, the Rector and Vestry appointed the McCaskill Endowment Scholarship Committee. The Charles and Pam McCaskill Endowment was established earlier in the year for the purpose of providing scholarships for certain educational and formational pursuits. The Rector and Vestry have the responsibility of appointing the Committee that will award scholarships. The Rector and Vestry appointed the following parishioners to the Committee: Barbara Cordova, Lynda DeMasco, Scott Herman, Karen Kilgore, Bob Kinnan, Jenny Ligon, and Pam McCaskill. The Vestry also elected Barbara Cordova to serve as Chair of the Committee.

The Vestry and Rector closed their meeting with the Lord's Prayer. The meeting was then adjourned.

The next regular meeting will be Monday, September 21, at 5:30pm in the Multipurpose Room of Tucker Hall (or by video conference). As always, anyone in the parish is welcome to attend. If you wish to be on the agenda and speak, however, please notify the Rector no later than the previous Tuesday, September 15, when he writes the agenda and then sends the agenda to the Vestry.

Anglophile Alert!

If you're a fan of English history, perhaps you've discovered British novelist Hilary Mantel's trilogy of the rise and fall of Thomas Cromwell, the son of a Stepney blacksmith who rose to highest office during the reign of King Henry VIII: Wolf Hall (2009), Bring Up the Bodies (2012) and the newly-published The Mirror and the Light (2020). Mantel won the prestigious Booker Prize (among others) for her first two books and is shortlisted again for the award when the next Booker is scheduled to be announced this November. It's hard, almost impossible, to imagine her not winning for a record-setting third time. Booker-nominated books are generally regarded as the "best-of-the-best" reads, but, in my estimation, Mantel's three historical novels soar to the level of magisterial. Each builds upon the other, but each one can be read independently, as well, with equal parts pleasure. I am merely pages from finishing 'Mirror', trying to find reasons to delay its ending, such is my lingering delight with her brilliantly-conceived stories and characters. In a lifetime of avid reading, I can think of few other books to rave about so enthusiastically...(well, perhaps, the Bible!).

My reading tastes run in all sorts of directions, and with COVID-19, I've been able to satisfy my pursuits more voraciously. Having read Mantel's first two novels when they were published, this last one hits all the highlights of those and builds and climaxes to a smashing conclusion. Every note in my literary taste buds are ignited: history, political intrigue, Church-State entanglements, monarchical dynastic rivalries, perfection of language and dialogue, incomparable settings and unforgettable character delineation.

As a teaser, you might want to watch the 2015 British dramatic adaptation of Wolf Hall (available on Netflix). Mark Rylance intuitively portrays the magnetic, ultra-serious Cromwell; Damian Lewis is perfectly cast as the mercurial king, as is Claire Foy as Anne Boleyn, the first of Henry's serial wife murders (Foy, as Elizabeth II, in The Crown series); Joanne Whalley proves the pious and ever-suffering Queen Catherine, Henry's first wife and daughter of Their Most Catholic Majesties Ferdinand and Isabella of Spain. This ill-fated marriage launches the most consequential royal divorce in European history and is the historical setup for Mantel's work of literary gratification. As with everything else these days, one may Google the books and get the overview of each one.

Contrary to (outdated and disproven) conventional scholarly Protestant histories, the ordinary religious English subject (clerics included) was not clamoring for ecclesiastical overreach, doctrinal upheaval and papal overthrow. This largely occurred "from above", i.e., politically, motivated as much by Cromwell's royal and personal ambitions than by the grievances of the faithful. Martin Luther was utterly despised by Henry--until he wasn't--which means, until newly-minted Continental Lutheranism became quasi-conveniently adopted by the king's amenable-to-annulment (divorce) Archbishop of Canterbury Thomas Cranmer. So, the Old Order of Christendom comes tumbling down, dismantled by Lord Cromwell's (monstrous) orchestrations. Oddly (to me), the author type casts Cromwell rather sympathetically (try selling that to the Irish!).

Inevitably and fittingly (sorry!:)), Cromwell finds himself ignominiously 'shortened' in the Tower, a la Sir Thomas More, Queen Anne, et al., in Henrician due course. From there on, our own religiously and politically derivative history as Anglicans (Episcopalians in the U.S.) has been indelibly impacted by the folks who inhabit this unforgettable Mantel-ian achievement.


This is compelling reading for serious readers. I found it great fun, too, laughing aloud numerous times at the twists and fates of our forebears. And cringing at the Machiavellian brutality of it all...!

Do yourself a favor in these sequestered times: read these novels!







The Twenty-Year Anniversary Celebration and Rededication of the St. Peter's Labyrinth

Due to safety concerns, this will be a private gathering on September 19, 2020.

How many questions were you able to answer from last month's Rock Road Labyrinth Guild quiz? Here are the answers.

- 1. Our design is modeled after the Chartres Cathedral Labyrinth.
- 2. Beverly Clark designed and built the Labyrinth, her initials are in a rock embedded in the Labyrinth. Next time you walk the labyrinth look for this rock.
- 3. The Labyrinth was begun in 1999 and completed for the Millennium New Years Eve walk December 31, 1999 sponsored by the Labyrinth Guild.
- 4. Bishop Folt's presided over the dedication of the Labyrinth Saturday, September 16th (WHAT YEAR?) at 2 pm with special music and liturgy followed by a reception in the parish hall.
- 5. Our design originates from Chartres, France.
- 6. Since the Labyrinth is not a maze, we cannot use the term paths in the plural. There is only one path. The term circuits refer to the number of times the path goes around the center.
- 7. Our Chartres Labyrinth contains eleven circuits.
- 8. The Labyrs of the Labyrinth are the double-axe or butterfly figures between the turns of the path. In the Eleven-Circuit Medieval Labyrinth there are ten labrys.
- 9. The Lunations of the Labyrinth are the outer cusps and foils that encircle the Chartres-style Eleven-Circuit Medi eval Labyrinth. There are 28 per¹/₄ of the outer circle.
- 10. The Petals of the Labyrinth in the Chartres style Labyrinth has six in the center. Symbolic of the six days of Creation, they also symbolize the rose and the lily.

- False A Labyrinth has one way in and one way out leading to the center such as our Labyrinth. Some
 Labyrinths have dual entries but that's a topic for discussion at another time. Mazes, in contrast, have dead ends
 and are meant to confuse.
- 2. False Labyrinths are found all over the world, ancient and new.
- 3. False Labyrinths have various amounts of circuits depending on the size.
- 4. False Labyrinths have a plethora of shapes found in ancient times and new.
- 5. True Labyrinth Journey is an app.
- 6. False We all walk at different paces, easiest place to pass is on a turn.
- 7. False Stopping is allowed, some like to meditate when a thought occurs at a specific point in a walk.
- 8. False Our labyrinth is open 24/7.
- 9. False There is a brass plate on the side of the Labyrinth asking for folks not to climb on the wall. There is not a guard rail installed at the top for this very reason.
- 10. True A carved octagonal cover stone bearing the shape of the Chartres Labyrinth is on the Main Street side of the Labyrinth wall where you can follow the path with your finger.

Dear St. Peter's Family,

This year we celebrate the twenty year anniversary of our St. Peter's labyrinth, and for the past twenty years, no doubt our labyrinth has helped us in accomplishing our mission at St. Peter's. It has always been our purpose to give glory to God by knowing Christ and making him known to others.

A labyrinth is different from a maze in that a labyrinth does not lead you in the wrong direction or down fruitless paths. When you take your first step on the labyrinth, you are always moving toward the center, which in our case is Jesus Christ. Since the stones were set twenty years ago, a cross has been at the center of our labyrinth, representative of the Christ at the center of our lives. Jesus is always inviting us down the path, to follow him. Jesus tells us that he is the Way (John 14:6).

Many of us have walked the labyrinth at various stages in our own spiritual pilgrimage. Perhaps we have had moments when we felt farther from the center, but we Christians are always invited to take one step closer to the center, trusting that we are no less on the Way. Though we may walk through the valley of the shadow of death, we will fear no evil; for we trust that God is with us along the way, his rod and staff will always comfort us. The labyrinth has been and will continue to be a tool for us to *know* Christ.

It seems fitting that our labyrinth was designed by somebody who came into the midst of our parish through another outreach ministry of our church, St. Peter's School. Beverly Clark was inspired to join St. Peter's Episcopal Church when her son was attending St. Peter's School. Once Beverly joined the parish and became active in the life of the parish, she had a vision for the labyrinth. Others joined Beverly in the vision for the spiritual tool that would become a gift to the greater community.

Quite often in the week, I see people walking the labyrinth. Some of them are parishioners, and many others are not. Perhaps those walking the labyrinth are fellow citizens of Kerrville or folks just passing through the Hill Country. Regardless, we can celebrate the fact that we are clearly inviting others onto our campus where we find sanctuary.

On September 19, a few of us will gather to rededicate the labyrinth in celebration of the twenty year anniversary. We will record the rededication and the video will then be available to all at our YouTube Channel. We ask that you join us in prayers of thanksgiving for our labyrinth. We give thanks for the labyrinth and the twenty years in which it has provided a tangible tool to help us know Christ and to make him known to others. May the Lord bless the next twenty years and all those who walk in the Way.


